35 years after Etan Patz vanished, boy's murder trial opens

NEW YORK (AP) — The little boy named Etan Patz was a "tiny man with a big heart" who couldn't wait to walk to his school bus stop alone on the day he vanished, a prosecutor said Friday.

Patz's "beautiful little life" was snuffed out the very day he achieved that childhood freedom in 1979, Manhattan Assistant District Attorney Joan Illuzzi-Orbon said as she began the trial of Pedro Hernandez, a mentally ill man who worked in a nearby shop at the time and confessed to killing the boy many years later.

The prosecutor's opening statement evoked a scene from another era, a time before cell phones or laptops, when even in New York City, children "played outside until their mothers called them home at dinner time."

"A time when hippies, not hipsters, graced the streets of downtown Manhattan. This is the moment we're about to step back into, and into a crime that changed the face of this city forever, a cautionary tale and a defining moment, a loss of innocence," Illuzzi-Orbon said. "This was the moment in time when Etan Patz lived, and it's the moment in time when Etan Patz died."

Both Hernandez and Etan's father, Stan Patz, sat stock-still as the prosecutor spoke. Hernandez' wife, Rosemary, was also in the packed courtroom.

Thirty-five years after Etan disappeared in a case that shaped the nation's approach to missing children, Hernandez is going on trial for his murder and kidnapping.

Hernandez emerged as a suspect in 2012, based on a tip from his brother-in-law, who had been trying to alert authorities for years after Hernandez alluded to the crime in remarks to friends and relatives in the 1980s, the prosecutor said.

The defense hinges on convincing jurors that the confession is false, and suggesting that the real killer may be a convicted Pennsylvania child molester who had been a prime suspect for years.

"It will be, I think, an extremely interesting case," state Supreme Court Justice Maxwell Wiley told prospective jurors earlier this month, adding that those chosen would be in for "an experience they'll never forget."

In considering evidence that reaches back to 1979, ju-

rors will delve into a missing child case that helped inject a new protectiveness into American parenting. Last seen walking alone to the bus stop, Etan became one of the first missing children featured on milk cartons. His parents advocated for legislation that created a nationwide law-enforcement framework to address such cases. The anniversary of his disappearance is now National Missing Children's Day.

The trial is expected to last up to three months and feature witnesses including Etan's mother, psychologists, an inmate informant who knows Hernandez, and possibly other informants testifying against the earlier suspect.

The seven-man, five-woman jury was chosen from a pool of about 700 people.

Some openly wondered about bringing a case to trial after so many years.

Prosecutors have spotlighted Hernandez's videotaped, hours-long confessions, in which he says he offered Etan a soda to entice him into the basement of the Manhattan convenience store where Hernandez worked.

Then, Hernandez said, he choked the boy and dumped him, still alive, in a box with some curbside trash. Etan's body has never been found.

"Something just took over me, and I was just choking him," said Hernandez, 54, of Maple Shade, New Jersey. "He just kind of stood there, and I just felt bad, what I did."

Defense lawyers say Hernandez' confession is fiction, dreamed up by a mentally ill man with a low IQ and a

history of hallucinations — and fueled by over six hours of police questioning before Hernandez was read his rights.

After confessing, Hernandez told a defense psychologist his memory of the killing "feels like a dream" and he wasn't sure it had really happened.

Hernandez's lawyers also plan to point to longtime suspect Jose Ramos, a Pennsylvania prisoner who dated a woman who sometimes cared for Etan. Authorities said Ramos made incriminating statements when questioned about Etan in the 1980s,

though he never confessed to killing the boy. Ramos has denied it, but a civil court found him liable for Etan's death in 2004 after Ramos stopped cooperating with questioning.

Flu hospitalizations of elderly hit record high, CDC says

NEW YORK (AP) — Some new evidence this is a particularly bad flu season: Flu-related hospitalizations of the elderly are the highest since the government started tracking that statistic nine years ago.

About 198 out of every 100,000 people 65 and older have been hospitalized with flu-related illness this flu season. That's roughly 86,000, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

CDC officials released the new flu season numbers on Friday.

It's the highest level seen since the government started tracking the statistic in the 2005-2006 flu season. The previous record was 183 per 100,000, during the flu season two years ago.

That flu season and this one were dominated by a virus known as H3N2. This year, the flu vaccine is not built for the H3N2 strain, which is the one that's spreading most widely.

Overall, the flu vaccine is only 23 percent effective this winter, CDC officials said recently.

That's one of the worst performances in

the last decade, since U.S. health officials started routinely tracking how well vaccines work. In the best flu seasons, the vaccines were 50 to 60 percent effective.

Among infectious diseases, flu is considered one of the nation's leading killers. On average, about 24,000 Americans die each flu season, according to the CDC.

The CDC doesn't do a national count of adult flu deaths. But a tally of deaths from 122 U.S. cities indicated that 9 percent of all deaths last week were attributed to flu and pneumonia. That's not a record, but it's higher than what's been seen in the thick of most recent flu seasons. It reached 10 percent two winters ago.

The good news is flu season seems to have peaked, at least for much of the country, officials say.

"Nationally, we're on the decline. But we're still going up in some areas," said Lyn Finelli, the CDC's flu surveillance chief.

Flu seems to be receding in the Southeast and Southwest, for example. But it's surging in New England and the West Coast.

Final charge dropped against Detroit cop in fatal raid

DETROIT (AP) — At the prosecutor's request, a judge on Friday dismissed the last charge against a Detroit police officer who fatally shot a 7-year-old girl during a raid and said she's willing to be the "scapegoat" if critics don't like the result.

Two trials against Joseph Weekley ended without verdicts on a charge of reckless use of a gun. During the second trial, Judge Cynthia Gray Hathaway dismissed the most serious charge, involuntary manslaughter, saying there was insufficient evidence.

Weekley shot Aiyana Stanley-Jones as she slept on a couch in a Detroit home in 2010. It occurred during a frenzied raid by elite officers who burst through the door to search for a murder sus-

pect after throwing a flash grenade to confuse anyone inside. A reality TV crew recorded the scene from the street.

Weekley insisted he accidentally pulled the trigger during a struggle with Aiyana's grandmother. She denied grabbing the weapon.

Assistant prosecutor Rob Moran told the judge that the misdemeanor was being dropped in the "best interests of justice." He didn't elaborate.

Hathaway emphasized that two juries, in 2013 and 2014, couldn't reach a unanimous verdict.

"It isn't the judge's decisions that caused these juries to not reach a decision," she said. "But I can tell you this: If anyone is looking for a scapegoat for justice,

then you've got one here as owner, coach and quarterback. ... If someone needs a scapegoat for what's happening here — and what's happening here is justice — then put it on me."

Weekley left the courtroom through a private door. Defense attorney Steve Fishman said prosecutors were courageous by closing the case.

Outside court, a spokesman for Aiyana's family criticized the judge for her comments.

"She's not a scapegoat. She's irresponsible," said Ron Scott, referring to Hathaway's decision to dismiss the involuntary manslaughter charge before a jury at the second trial could consider it.
