Services Return In-House Option

The lights are returning to favorite locations in Sidney. Those favorite hangouts offering the coffees, delectable delights, and conversations with wait staff that have been put on hold for weeks are beginning to return.

On April 24, Nebraska Gov. Pete Ricketts announced easing of the Directed Health Measure (DHM) that suspended dine-in options restaurants. As of May 4, restaurants were allowed to seat up to 50 percent of their capacity.

Some Sidney businesses were quick to roll out the welcome mat while others are taking a more cautious approach.

On Monday, May 4, Dude's Steakhouse welcomed some of its typical breakfast crowd, as did Perkins.

Tuesday more restaurants opened their doors to more than curbside and delivery, including Grandma Jo's at 12th and Illinois Street in Sidney. The challenge is some of the local establishments are not designed for carry-out service. Their menu is designed for interaction between staff and customers.

Roxanne "Roxie" Worster, owner of Grandma Jo's, is excited to see customers dining in.

"It's been great having customers here, someone to talk to," she said.

She said the return to dine-in service, even at 50 percent of capacity, brought in customers who had been purchasing carry-out orders. Those same customers were glad to eat inside with a cup of coffee, she said.

Della's, at the corner of 10th and Illinois Street, is continuing take-out only service.

The Silver Dollar is open for dine-in service, as is Sam & Louie's on north 10th and Perkins. McDonald's has kept the lobby open for carry-out only while continuing its drive-up window. Arbys and Runza have kept service to drive-through only.

Dairy Queen in Sidney is continuing drive-up and carry-out service only for the time. District manager Eric Packer said the decision is based in part on health of his staff.

"We have made the decision to keep our lobby closed for the time being. Because of interstate travel, we feel it is in the best interest of our employees and our guests to keep our lobby closed. My employees health is the most important thing to me and that is the driving force behind our decision," Packer said.

Beans and Steams, the coffee house located on Glover Road, has chosen to

delay opening the lobby.

"Our drive through has been a special customer touch point since the first day we opened," said co-owner Pat Keane. "We see our drive through as a way to supply the same great customer service we can do inside. If we have cars in line, we try to go out and greet the next car in line to not only keep the line moving quickly, but also that we can give that personal interaction with our great customers. We want every chance we can get to make their day with our staff's smiling faces and great service."

He said he and his wife chose from the beginning not to use the "squawk box" as it is called. They prefer meeting customers face to face. Therefore Beans and Steams has chosen to stay drive through-only for now as the directives call for service staff to wear masks, tape lines and more and for

VA Claims Clinic Coming to Sidney

Few if any who offer their services to military service. Their experiences are unique to their duties. The uniform has an implied risk, a risk that sometimes results in injuries that follow service men and women the rest of their lives.

A Claims Clinic is scheduled for June 25 in Sidney to assist veterans. The clinic will be held at the Cheyenne County Community Center. The clinic is conducted by QTC (Quality, Timeliness, Customer Service) who is subcontracted to conduct mobile clinics for veterans.

"This to get everything done," said Cheyenne County Veteran Service Officer Fred Wiedeberg. "It just streamlines the process."

The Claims Clinic is to start a new claim or an increase on a previously-awarded claim.

He said the process from Intent to File to receiving benefits can take a year or more.

Veteran claims can be any injury related to active service, according to Wiedeberg.

"It can be anything from hearing loss to back injury," he said.

He said it can be any kind of injury that occurred while on active duty, but it must be an injury that occurred during active duty.

"It has to be from active duty," he stressed.

Wiedeberg said that for Cheyenne County will be a direct result of active service.

"I think this (clinic) will be a lot of hearing loss and tinnitus," he said.

He added there could be a host of other physical concerns as well.

"We do file some PTSD claims," he said. "The key is the illness or injury has to be service-related."

Wiedeberg added re-evaluations can be requested. However, the VA asks veterans to wait if the last evaluation has been within four years.

He encourages area veterans to contact the local office before the Claims Clinic arrives in Sidney. The Cheyenne County Veteran Service Office is not an extension of the Veterans Administration.

"We are basically a liaison and an advocate," Wiedeberg said.

He said his job is to advocate for the veterans and to guide them through the claims process.

The Sidney stop is in part a result of Wiedeberg visiting a VA Claims Clinic in Alliance last year. He later asked a State Veteran Service Officer about hosting a clinic in Sidney.

Wiedeberg can be reached at 308-254-3300. He encourages veterans to call for an appointment. An appointment.

Dale Wesley Farmer, age 84, passed away on Friday, April 24, 2020 at Sidney Regional Medical Center Extended Care in Sidney, NE. He graduated from Callaway High School in 1953 and attended five semesters at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. good reason. Keane said they are blessed to have a drive through; some do not have that choice and it is great they can open back up again. He said Beans and Steams serves "fun and comfort" and the staff is doing its best to achieve this.

"It just doesn't feel just right to us to open inside and have masks and tape lines everywhere at this point. We constantly wash our hands, sterilize pens and clip boards and more. We stay our distance in the drive through for the safety of our staff and customers," Keane said.

"We hope things continue to get better and we can open 'normally' soon. We talk and listen to our customers and we'll do whatever the majority of the community would like us to do and the feedback has been very supportive of our decision. If they change their mind, so will we. We hope the day we can see everyone's smiling faces inside comes soon!" Keane said.

Sidney's Applebee's location returned to curbside, pickup and take-out service recently. Dine-in service will return tomorrow, Thursday, May 14.

According to Melissa Hariri, Executive Director, Communications, Applebee's Grill & Bar, has locations already offering dine-in service. Restaurants in Sidney, North Platte, York and Scottsbluff will open for dine-in service on May 14. The Norfolk location is scheduled to reopen May 31.

The Cheyenne County Community Center announced May 5 it is open to the public. The Center has fitness classes scheduled for May, and is following the social distancing and 10-person limit in classes. Likewise, a maximum of 10 people are allowed in the weight room. Weight room clients are encouraged to clean every piece of equipment after use. Basketball and racquetball will remain closed until further notice.

If you have not read Patrick Henry's "Give Me Liberty" speech in the last week, look it up right now and give it some time.

Mr. Henry gave this speech in 1775 to reluctant members of the Second Virginia Convention to develop a military response to British aggression. He was calling out men to rise to action in the face of government oppression.

This idea sounds strangely familiar right now.

I have been a red-blooded, white, blue-collared American my entire life. It is time to stand up and be bold for our American freedoms. As I quote Mr. Henry's speech I want you to challenge yourself to see what rises up in you.

Now before the bashing comes that says I am denying the real existence and threat of a disease, that is a load of malarkey. Of course, there is a real disease. Again, to quote Patrick Henry, "Should I keep back my opinions at

I am not going to live in fear. 2 Timothy 1:7 states, "For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." Fear has taken a death grip on American citizens and really people all around the globe. Fear of the disease. Fear of lack of toilet paper. Fear of food chains being disrupted. Fear of loss of freedom.

He goes on to say, "They tell us, sir, that we are weak; unable to cope with so formidable an adversary. But when shall we be stronger? Will it be the next week, or the next year? Will it be when we are totally disarmed...? Shall we gather strength by irresolution and inaction?... Sir, we are not weak if we make a proper use of those means which the God of nature hath placed in our power. The millions of people, armed in the holy cause of liberty, and in such a country as that we possess, are invincible by any force which our enemy can send against us. Besides,

we shall not fight our battles alone. There is a just God who presides over the destinies of nations, and who will raise up friends to fight our battles for us. The battle, sir, is not to the strong alone; it is to the vigilant, the active, the brave."

There is a lot packed into his words. Who or what is the formidable adversary? Is it the disease? Is it the government? Is it one another?

When will it be good enough or safe enough or peaceful enough to go back to normal? Will we ever go back to normal and what does normal even look like?

If believers do not begin to stand up and PEACEFULLY help reopen America I really believe it will be opened with force, anger and violence.

I could not agree more with Patrick Henry's conclusion, "Is life so dear, or peace so sweet, as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it, Almighty God! I know not what course others may take; but as for me, give me liberty or give me death!"

What If?

Two months ago, give or take a few days or so, "normal" took a left turn in the Panhandle.

We were strongly encouraged to stay home unless on an essential errand or duty. The "encouragement" was even stronger if we traveled outside of the Panhandle, at which point we were to take a two-week staycation i.e. self-quarantine. As of May 4, the economic, emotional and social lights are starting to flicker back on. Restaurants and cafes can have a limited number of dine-in customers. Customers can return to their favorite watering hole (breakfast/lunch counters) and redevelop the connection with wait staff and the motif that invites relaxation.

Along the way I have read some, maybe too much, of the social media. Some of them are plagiarist writers, borrowing someone else's ideas. One of those ideas discourages returning to "normal." The claim is normal didn't work; why go back. I've also read fifth quarter analyzers claiming we are seeing a reset switch for society, and others that End Times are being staged.

Maybe we need to look at the events of the last few months from the simplest details to the complicated. When the coronavirus was first announced to the public this year, health officials from the White House to the local offices stated the first line of defense against contracting the virus is ... basic hygiene. Wash your hands. Cover your mouth when coughing or sneezing. Stay home when you're sick. Clean surfaces diligently, especially during illnesses. These should all sound familiar from our early years. These advisories should sound like what we were taught as children. The question then, is if society has become lax in personal hygiene.

What if this virus contains lessons that require us to slow down to see? What if this is a finals test? Put away the books, no calculator or computer. All you have is what is in your mind, or heart in this case. What if this is the kind of test where the answers are not just in the questions, but also in the imposed solitude? Why do people seek time at the lake, quiet trails, weekenders in the mountains? The simple answer is to get away from the noise. What is one of the characteristics of businesses getting closed or limited? More time at home, away from the stuff you call important.

We have a lot to learn. Among things is how we react when threatened. There is the fight or flight. I offer there is also the immobilizing fear that leads people to want someone else to take care of them. No doubt there is a virus. No doubt certain precautions should be put in place. The question lost in the grey is how much is too much. What if some of the rebels are right and we need to carefully let this take its course? The operative word is still carefully.

What if in the effort to save life we have let go of living in exchange for existing?

A few days ago, maybe a week, I walked to the post office and had an unexpected conversation with a friend. It was the kind of conversation I wished we were on a Mayberry set with sidewalk benches every 50 yards or so. With a cup of coffee we might have spent the afternoon like a couple of codgers. It shouldn't surprise us that in the effort of staying safe, we have let go of one of the characteristics that make is more than just mammals in the food chain: human interaction.

What if one of the lessons in these months with no clear date of completion is the importance of friends, even casual friends, family, neighbors, even the teens who spend the afternoons running the neighborhood? What if we have taken so much for granted — health, relationships, our involvement in government — that it takes a sincere wake-up call to change course? We are obviously in challenging times, even as the proverbial light is coming back on.

The remaining question, the one that might take some time to fully answer, is what have we learned from it.

Jobs As We Knew Them Are Over

We are discovering many things as a result of the corona virus and its impact. Among them are that work and jobs centralized in office buildings and business parks are over.

Prior to 2020, only about 8 percent of wage and salaried employees in the U.S. worked remotely at least one day a week according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Then the virus hit and so did the landscape of work within our country as millions of Americans employed by thousands of companies were told they had to work from home. Now, depending on which surveys you look at, between 54 and 62 percent of workers don't want to return to the office at all, and 70 percent want employers to at least offer a work-from-home option.

Benefits to having employees work from home are myriad. Among them are elimination of physical commuting, which allows workers to recover an average of one to two hours a day — hours than could be spent with family or non-work activities and hobbies. Gone would be traffic jams and associated aggravations, and fewer cars on the road would make vehicles last longer due to less

start-and-stop daily grinds. Environmental benefits would include cleaner air and less consumption of fossil fuels.

The jury is still out on worker productivity, but many employers say they've

discovered remote workers are more productive. Why? Fewer workplace distractions, for one. Less time is lost to personal conversations, gossip, office politics and useless group meetings when people can work remotely. But metrics will have to be redefined to properly measure productivity and, going forward, they should exclusively be outcome-oriented.

If an employee needs to work in and office setting eight hours a day to meet productivity goals but can prove he/she can meet or surpass those goals working six hours a day at home, why would an employer even consider cutting benefits or wages based hours worked per week? What idiot manager would risk losing such a productive employee if the company's goals are met? Indeed, remote work could

mean the end of the five-day, 40-hour work week, and I say good riddance!

In the new virus-risk world, you can say goodbye to the open floor plan in office settings. Employees of companies insisting workers come in to the office will demand costly safety considerations including barriers, masks, sanitizing equipment and more.

Don't even mention liability if an employee is infected at work.

Say farewell to office buildings, and watch the business real estate market collapse. We now know stacking large numbers of people on top of one another in small areas is not smart. I predict many office complexes will be repurposed to apartments and condominiums.

Companies such as Zillow, Google, Facebook, Amazon and Capital One are already shifting gears to accommodate a future where remote work dominates. Some have told workers to plan to work remotely at least until the end of this year. And while those working manual labor, service industry, manufacturing and similar jobs demanding physical presence won't yet be able to enjoy remote work, at least they'll have shorter commute times.



Ricketts Expresses Confidence in COVID-19 Response

On May 4, Nebraska Gov. Pete Ricketts gave restaurants and cafes the go-ahead to offer limited dine-in seating, relaxing the previous Directed Health Measure (DHM) that had closed restaurants except for delivery, carry-out and curbside pickup.

The relaxing of the DHMs also allows massage parlors, hair and nail salons to reopen.

Since the change in DHMs, the State has also activated the Nebraska National Guard to assist in mobile COVID testing sites. Mobile testing was held in Sidney Saturday. Mobile testing was also held in Bridgeport and Alliance on Sunday, May 10, and Chadron and Gordon on Monday, May 11. According to the Panhandle Public Health District, the tests are COVID tests, not antibody tests.

The PPHD is reporting 73 confirmed cases from 1,259 tests in the Panhandle; 38 have recovered and no deaths have been attributed to COVID-19. As of May 11, Cheyenne County had nine cases with five recovered and out of isolation, Kimball County had 10 cases and all are out of isolation, Morrill County reported nine cases with one recovered and out of isolation, Scotts Bluff County reported 44 cases with 2 having recovered and out

of isolation, Dawes County reported one case, and Box Butte County had one case that is recovered and out of isolation.

The largest number of new confirmed cases are in the 10 to 19 age bracket at a virtual tie with the 40 to 49 age bracket. According to the PPHD graphs provided, most of the cases are a result of close contact. A small percentage were contracted by travel or community spread, according to the PPHD. By gender, the cases are almost even with 39 female and 34 male testing positive.

Gov. Ricketts is also encouraging residents to take part in the TestNebraska.com assessment. The program is a way to conduct COVID-19 testing in Nebraska faster. The goal is to increase the rate of COVID-19 testing so Nebraskans can have better access to testing and help stem the spread of COVID-19, and return the state to normal as quickly as possible, according to the testnebraska.com website.

Throughout the month of May, PPHD is reminding people to respect the following guidelines:

- Wear a mask when possible.
- Wash your hands frequently. Wash your hands with soap for at least 20 seconds and sanitize when available.
- Monitor your symptoms. If you experience a cough, fever, shortness of breath, headache, sore throat, chills, muscle pain, or loss of taste or smell call your doctor, clinic, or our 24/7 line at

- Socially distance in public and at work. Use the six-foot rule as much as possible.
- Only sit with people from your household when at church. Stay six feet from other households.
- Stay home. Do not take unnecessary trips outside the home. Respect the ten-person limit. Non-essential out-of-state travel is discouraged.
- Shop alone and only shop once a week. Do not take family with you.
- Help kids follow social distancing. Play at home. No group sports. And no
