# Fischer Visits Panhandle

Sen. Deb Fischer met with local officials throughout western Nebraska recently, including officials at Sidney Regional Medical Center Aug. 30. After the meeting, she took time to meet with the press. Some of the major topics she has encountered on her tour are housing, the impact of inflation and jobs. She said in her stop in Kimball, officials explained their housing project. She said the Air Force plan to update the ICBM (Intercontinental Ballistic Missile system) will bring workers in in phases, six weeks at a time. She also said the planned expansion of Clean Harbors near Kimball could benefit communities regionally. "There's good things going on here," she said.

She was asked about the apparent disparity between the number of workers and available jobs with the number of companies having job openings they can't fill. She said some workers are seeking flexibility, and others have found working at home as an option. "A lot of people were able to work from home (during COVID)," she said. She was asked about the impact of the proposed student loan forgiveness plan as presented by President Biden. She said she stands against it because the President doesn't have the Constitutional authority to forgive student loans. She said the program, estimated to cost billions, will create "ever greater hardship." On Aug. 24, following President Biden's announcement of the student loan relief proposal, Fischer released a statement on the proposal.

## 2022 Nebraska Youth Survey Indicated Preference for Small Communities

Work needed on inclusion and career opportunity awareness

LINCOLN — Greater Nebraska youth remain committed to small communities but there is work to be done in showing them they can have the future they want in their hometowns, according to Nebraska Community Foundation's new 2022 Youth Survey.

Nebraska Community Foundation (NCF), in partnership with the University of Nebraska at Omaha's Center for Public Affairs Research (CPAR) and local school districts, surveyed 715 middle and high school students between January and May of 2022. Participating communities included Bertrand, Butler County, Columbus, Howells and Stuart.

Building on a trend from previous surveys, respondents expressed a strong preference for small communities. Only 4% said they would like to live in a community larger than any in Nebraska. Safety, good schools and proximity to family continue to be the top characteristics of their ideal community, and the vast majority (71%) said there is no stigma associated with returning to your hometown as an adult.

Though Nebraska youth seem to not see social downsides to returning home, results suggest they are susceptible to misperceptions about a lack of career or professional upsides to living in Greater Nebraska. Healthcare (22%),

# Trafficking: The Reality

It's a theme used over and over on the big screen. Fun-loving young adults visit a foreign country and their week in Rome becomes a walk through a nightmare with a one-man army to the rescue. There's also the desperate immigrant who was led to a unofficial border crossing and obligated into forced labor, or worse, in exchange for payment of getting them across the border. While these scenarios occur to some degree, the deeper story involves coercion and grooming, according to discussion at the August 29 Elevate community discussion. Elevate is an effort to host discussions about social issues in an effort to bring about positive change to the Sidney community. The Elevate committee started with

a question of "why aren't we doing something about...?" which led to the formation of a committee that organizes events to encourage discussion on community issues. The August 29 event is the second Community Conversation hosted by Elevate. The first was held in May on suicide. The August 29 event included speakers on domestic violence, self-defense and state officials speaking on trafficking. Officials discussed what trafficking is and what it isn't, and dispelled some common misconceptions. Glenn Parks, Coordinator of the Nebraska Human Trafficking Task Force at State of Nebraska, provided insight into the two definitions of human trafficking: labor and sex. "Part of my job has been to convince people it happens," Parks said in the Aug. 29 meeting. Parks started his presentation talking about sex trafficking. He

said statistically, the sex trade goes much further west than Lincoln and Omaha. "Per Capita, Grand Island has more escort ads than Omaha," he said. He showed a map that displayed sex trafficking from the metropolitan areas of east Nebraska to the western state line. "The first half of this year, we had 12 convictions," he said. He added there have been nine sex trafficking convictions in the Scottsbluff area. He said sex trafficking involves three parts: the sex act, a commercial exchange, and conducting the above without consent. All three are needed to define sex trafficking, he said. Any two of the three and the definition changes. Ultimately, he said, sex trafficking is forced prostitution. Parks said labor trafficking is

"Yet another economically backwards policy from the Biden administration that unfairly pushes the burden of these loans onto all American taxpayers and further fuels the inflation fire," she said.

Fischer said the proposal is an effort to secure votes. "It's not just the multi-billion-dollar cost. These loans are not magically 'gone' — the debt is being transferred from those who borrowed it to current and future taxpayers."

The Penn Wharton Budget Model (PWBM) estimates the student loan forgiveness program will cost upwards of \$300 billion. PWBM is a non-partisan, research-based initiative that provides accurate, accessible and transparent economic analysis of public policy's fiscal impact, according to the organization's mission statement.

Sen. Fischer also talked about the importance of Sidney Regional Medical Center. She said it is important SRMC maintains its Critical Access status. Critical Access began as a means to bridge the gap in rural healthcare and has developed into a critical access hospital system with 1,328 facilities in 45 states, according to the National Library of Medicine.

She said the 340B program is a big asset to rural communities.

"It is beneficial to the hospital," she said.

According to the American Hospital Association, the 340B Drug Pricing Program has provided financial help to hospitals serving vulnerable communities for more than 25 years. Section 340B of the Public Health Service Act requires pharmaceutical manufacturers participating in Medicaid to sell out-patient drugs at discounted prices to health care organizations that care for many uninsured and low-income patients. The American Hospital Association says "340B-eligible hospitals are the safety net for their communities. The 340B program allows these hospitals to further stretch their limited resources and provide additional benefits and services."

harder to prove. It is an area that uses more emotional coercion than physical force. According to Parks, labor trafficking is also linked to illegal immigration.

"A lot of the victims are foreign nationals," he said.

The victims are held in a type of forced labor, modern slavery, with threats of physical confrontation, a recognized threat or non-physical coercion such as calling ICE, reporting the

victim committed a crime. The Labor trafficking victims are often in bondage regarding the cost of transporting across the border, and then inflated costs of housing and food. The draw, Parks said, is the U.S. minimum wage is much higher than wages in South and Central American countries.

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

### Lance Richard Barker

Lance Richard Barker died on Tuesday, August 9, 2022 after a long struggle with Parkinson's disease. Despite this disease, he had a full and rich life.



He was born March 29, 1938 in Sidney, Nebraska. His parents, Ross and Doris Barker, had him baptized on Palm Sunday of that year in the Light Memorial Presbyterian Church where he was confirmed in 1950 and where in 1969 he was ordained into the Ministry of Word and Sacrament of the Presbyterian Church. He attributed his lifelong interest in theology to the open mindedness of his Sunday school teachers and to the encouragement of his public school teachers to pursue a life of teaching and research.

Lance was a graduate of Sidney High School in 1956 and from the University of Wyoming in 1960, where he was selected to be a member of Phi Beta Kappa. In 1964 he graduated from San Francisco Theological Seminary where he was awarded the faculty fellowship to engage in further study. While at the seminary, he was Research Assistant to Dr. Robert Lee.

Together the two of them researched and put together the Directory of Centers for The Study of Society, a hand-book that was a great help not only to ministers, but also teachers, civic leaders, persons in business, governmental agencies, librarians, and researchers. Lance did further study at the Divinity School at the University of Chicago where he was awarded a PhD in 1976.

In the year 1970 Lance joined the faculty at the United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities in New Brighton, MN as a Doctoral Student/Teacher. His dissertation was titled: A Study of the Detroit Industrial Mission upon Five Selected Areas of Detroit Industry and Labor: 1964—1968.

From 1976 to his retirement in 2000 Lance taught at United Seminary as a full professor, and directed several nationally funded research projects focusing on rural congregations in the upper Midwest. At United he was the first person to be appointed to an endowed faculty chair: the Schilling Professor of Church and Economic Life.

Dr. Cindi Beth Johnson, of United, sent along comments from former students of Lance and professors after informing them of Lance's death: "A teacher with many gifts, Lance cared deeply about the importance of field education programs. He faithfully supported students and their supervisors in their placements, building a better context for learning... he mentored countless students, influencing not only those in the classroom but also in the communities they served. Reflecting on his death, alums talked about Lance as a favorite professor; a wise and gentle soul; interesting, interested, and helpful."

Much of Lance's research at United was

dedicated to new forms of field education ministry programs relevant to rural ministry in the five state region the seminary served. His sabbatical work with Professor, Dr. B. Edmon Martin, brought him great joy. Together they visited rural churches across the United States and parts of Canada, studying alternative forms of ministry to these rural church, their wives often accompanying them. Lance also

had a deep interest in theological education globally. He supported international students and traveled to seminaries in Costa Rica, Columbia, and Argentina. He and his wife, Gail, travelled to Romania supporting a young pastor and his wife in a rural church outside of Cluj-Napoca. In 1999, he and Gail attended the World Council of Churches Assembly in Zimbabwe, making contact with a former student in that country.

Lance co-edited Abundant Harvest, Essays on Rural Life and Ministry in Honor of Dean and Elsie Freudenberger, with Victor Klimoski in 2002. Lance and Ed Martin co-authored a book entitled Multiple Paths to Ministry: New Models for Theological Education, published in 2004.

In 1995, Lance and Gail Gullen Smith were married following the deaths in 1993 of their spouses, Susan N. Blons and R'Dean L. Smith. Lance and Gail were active members at First Presbyterian Church in South St. Paul, where Gail served as Director of Children's Ministries. Following his retirement in 2000, Lance and Gail moved to their lake home near Crosby, Minnesota. In 2006, they decided to move to Green Valley, Arizona where they have enjoyed friends, travelled, and shared in the ministry of Valley Presbyterian Church.

The blessings of joining together families are evident in the complexity and richness of life. Lance is survived by his wife, Gail, and her children Mark Fitzsimmons and spouse, Jane Fontana; Karen Chung and spouse Dr. Mark Chung; stepson the Reverend Adam Blons and spouse Megan Voorhees; and by grandchildren Lucy Chung, Satya Voorhees Blons, and Isa Voorhees Blons.

## Several Boat Ramps Closed at Calamus, Sherman Due to Low Water Levels

Extremely low water levels at two central Nebraska irrigation reservoirs are challenging boaters. The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission is asking

them to use their best judgment when launching at Calamus and Sherman reservoirs, as many ramps are closed.

Knolls middle lanes, Buckshot Bay west lane, and Nunda Shoal and Valley View flat boat ramps are closed to boater access. Boaters can use Homestead Knolls east and west lanes, and Buckshot Bay east lane.

At Sherman, Thunder Bay is closed to boater access, but Marina Bay is accessible.

Boaters with large boats, such as pontoons, may have difficulty loading and unloading at these reservoirs.

committee, said he learned that many victims of trafficking are groomed into the trade. He said he is also concerned that people are tracked on the internet for trafficking purposes. Trafficking also involves victims of both genders, Rademacher said.

"It's a shame. It's very real," he said.

He said he left the event feeling it sparked interest and curiosity in keeping young people safe.

Cheyenne County Sheriff Adam Frerichs, also a member of the Elevate committee, thought the meeting was very informative. He said it stressed being safe online.

"That was the high point to me," he added.

## When should you adjust your investment mix?

There are no shortcuts to investment success — you need to establish a long-term strategy and stick with it. This means you'll want to create an investment mix based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon — and then regularly review it to ensure it's still meeting your needs.

In fact, investing for the long term doesn't necessarily mean you should lock your investments in forever. Throughout your life, you'll likely need to make some changes.

Changes in your own goals or circumstances may also lead you to modify your investment mix. You might decide to retire earlier or later than you originally planned. You might even change your plans for the type of retirement you want, choosing to work part time for a few years. Your family situation may change — perhaps you have another child for whom you'd like to save and invest for college. Any of these events could lead you to review your portfolio to find new opportunities or to adjust your risk level — or both.

You might wonder if you should also consider changing your investment mix in response to external forces, such as higher interest rates or a rise in inflation, as we've

seen this year. It's certainly true that these types of events can affect parts of your portfolio, but it may not be advisable to react by shuffling your investment mix. After all, nobody can really predict how long these forces will keep their momentum — it's quite possible, for instance, that inflation will have subsided noticeably within a year. But more important, you should make investment moves based on the factors we've already discussed: your goals, risk tolerance, time horizon and individual circumstances.

By reviewing your portfolio regularly, possibly with the assistance of a financial professional, you can help ensure your investment mix will always be appropriate for your needs and goals.

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


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## What Are You Seeking?

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## The North Platte River – Multiuse Water

Built in the 1950s, the Dave Johnston power plant is located near Glenrock, Wyo. on the North Platte River. This coal-fired power plant uses North Platte River water for cooling. Combined energy produced from the four steam-powered generators is 922.2 megawatts. The power plant is operated by PacifiCorp and scheduled to be decommissioned in 2027.

The Laramie River Station power plant is located north of Wheatland, Wyo. on the Laramie River. The Laramie River is a major tributary to the North Platte River. Constructed in the 1970s, the coal-fired power plant went fully online in 1982. The plant's three steam-powered generators produce a combined output of 1,710 megawatts. The electricity produced is delivered to the Missouri Basin Power Project, whose participants include Basin Electric, Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, The Lincoln Electric System, and the Westar Minnesota Power Agency / Missouri River Energy Services.

In addition to the Laramie River Station, the Grayrocks dam and reservoir was constructed to supply cooling water for the power plant. The 104,000 acre-foot reservoir also provides recreational opportunities, flood control, and wildlife habitat.

Next is Kingsley Dam and Lake McConaughy or "Big Mac" located north of Ogallala. Kingsley dam construction started in 1936 and completed 1941. Kingsley dam is named after George Kingsley, a Minden banker and businessman. Kingsley dam is the second largest hydraulic filled earthen dam in the world. The dam is over three miles long and 162 feet high. The dam base has interlocking sheet steel pilings 30 to 160 deep down to the Brule clay layer.

The dam core consists of a mixture of loess soil and water pumped to form the dam. The mixture was allowed to dry, forming the dam. In the process doing this, Lake Ogallala was formed from the pumped loess mixture, just below the dam. The water facing side of the

dam is layered with 180,000 "jackstones" and limestone rock from Wyoming.

The jackstones look like the toy jack, a six-pointed stone, weighing over eight hundred pounds each.

Lake McConaughy or "Big Mac" reservoir formed behind Kingsley Dam. Lake McConaughy named after C.W. McConaughy, a grain merchant and mayor of Holdrege. Both McConaughy and Kingsley had a vision of supplemental irrigation for the south-central Nebraska area and the dam and lake / reservoir became a reality.

The lake is the largest in the state, has a capacity of 1,948,000 acre-feet, is twenty-two miles long, over three miles wide, and covers over 30,000 acres at capacity. In addition to providing irrigation and hydro-power generation, Lake McConaughy / Lake Ogallala provides a major recreational site for camping, boating, fishing, and windsurfing as well as wildlife habitat.

The construction for the Kingsley dam power plant started in 1981 and went online in 1984. There is one generator with a 51,900-kilowatt capacity. Central Nebraska Public Power and Irrigation District (CNPPID), a political subdivision of the State of Nebraska, owns the dam and manages the hydro-power plant at the dam.

Water from the reservoir irrigates approximately 109,000 acres in Gosper, Phelps, Kearney, Lincoln, and Dawson counties through over five hundred miles of canals and laterals. This water delivered through the Supply Canal to the three main irrigation canals E65, E67, and Phelps starting at Central's Diversion Dam on the Platte River.

CNPPID also has three hydro-power plants along the Supply Canal. These are the Jeffery, with two 10,800 kilowatt generators, Johnson No. 1 with two 10,030 kilowatt generators, and Johnson No. 2 with one 22,960-kilowatt generator. The power generated by CNPPID is sold to Nebraska Public Power District.

There are twenty-six smaller lakes along the Supply Canal. Some of these lakes are private, but others are open to the public. These lakes provide additional recreational opportunities

and wildlife habitat. The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission manage the designated Wildlife Management Areas and the recreational areas around these lakes and Lake McConaughy.

The last power plant we will address is the coal-fired Gerald Gentleman Station, located south of Sutherland, Neb. This is Nebraska's largest power plant, using both North and South Platte River water for cooling. The plant was commissioned in 1979 with a combined output of 1,365 megawatts for the two steam-powered generators. The plant is owned by Nebraska Public Power District and is consistently ranked as one of the lowest production-cost plants in the nation.

The waters in the reservoirs of the North

Platte River serve multiple purposes. Initially most were constructed for irrigation and hydro-power generation. As time progressed, additional beneficial uses for recreation, flood control, wildlife habitat, sediment retention, and endangered species became reality.

Conflicts between states over water have resulted in compacts, decrees, and interstate agreements to settle these disputes. For a full review of these, visit CompactAndDecrees2010.pdf (nebraska.gov), from the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources.

The waters of the North Platte River serve many beneficial uses. Proper management of this finite resource will ensure these uses are there for the future.

## UNL Crops Testing Winter Wheat Trials Available

Results of the 2022 UNL Crops Testing Winter Wheat trials are now available in the 2022 Fall Seed Guide. It can be found at [cropwatch.unl.edu/varietytest](http://cropwatch.unl.edu/varietytest) and includes details on yield, protein, test weight, ratings for disease characteristics, location summaries and weather information.

Contacts for individual seed companies are provided to assist farmers in identifying certified seed growers. Trial efforts in winter wheat were led by Drs. Cody Creech, Brian Maust, and Amanda Easterly. Also included in the publication are results summaries of barley and triticale advanced yield trials, conducted by Dr. Katherine Frels, the small grains breeder.

This year's inaugural cover photo contest winner was Dr. Sandeep Sakhale, a postdoctoral research associate at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The image features the variety trial plots at Mark Knobel's farm near Fairbury.

Despite a dry year in 2021, fall emergence of the winter wheat trials across the state was excellent and we experienced very little winter killing. Early spring green up was also promising across the state, leading to early season predictions that winter wheat yields were going to hold steady.

However, as the drought continued, the conditions deteriorated. In addition, hailstorms affected many parts of the state and trials were lost to hail at Clay, Red Willow/Hitchcock, Gosper, Deuel, and Box Butte Counties.

A late spring freeze during heading also impacted wheat yields, particularly for earlier-heading varieties. In the Panhandle, wheat stem sawfly pressure further impacted yield and performance and resistance to sawfly continues to be a trait that the Crops Testing team monitors in the varieties tested.

Locations for which the data was lost to hail or too severely impacted by the freeze damage has not been published, and we strongly recommend that growers make decisions based on multi-year and multi-location averages.

Furthermore, we encourage growers to diversify their variety selections and obtain seed as quickly as possible. Certified seed growers were impacted by the same difficult conditions and seed inventories are expected to be in short supply.

Lastly, we encourage growers to reach out to local Extension and industry partners with

questions about local growing conditions and optimizing fall planting for the continued drought. agriculture (14%) and education (8%) represented the top three most desirable industries among respondents, but there seems to be a disconnect between what they want to do and what they perceive to be available where they live. Of student respondents, 48% said if they were to not live in their community as an adult the main reason would be job or business opportunities elsewhere.

"Many of the industries students are pursuing have job openings in their communities," said Dr. Josie Gatti Schafer, CPAR. "And industries that are hiring the most are industries Greater Nebraska youth have shown interest in, including healthcare, education and recreation. Opportunities like internships are a great way to help students on their career path and ensure they understand the potential in their own communities."

This year's respondents included 149 students of color, or 24% of the sample. Students of all ethnic and racial backgrounds said they value "diverse cultural experiences" and were likely to take a stand against "unfair treatment" — but the survey found notable differences among the experiences of non-white students. They reported feeling less connected to the places they live and are less likely to live there in the future.

Compared to white students, students of color were more likely to plan to work directly after high school, they wanted more organizations to engage with in their community and were less likely to want to live in the area they live now as an adult. In addition, they reported seeing unfair treatment at slightly higher rates than the white peers.

"With diversity increasing, outreach and inclusion is critical to population sustainability and growth in Greater Nebraska," Schafer said. "The variation in response across demographic groups suggests some work is to be done to ensure inclusion and that everyone feels connected to their hometown."

The results of the Youth Survey begin to reveal the priorities, values, concerns and desires of these individuals as well as factors that may influence their decision to return to or remain in Greater Nebraska in the future. The hope is that these data may serve as a resource for NCF's network of 1,500 community volunteers as well as other organizations and entities that share an interest in people attraction. "Nebraska Community Foundation's network of affiliated funds and volunteers across the state are committed to keeping their communities thriving, magnetic places," said Jeff Yost, president and CEO of Nebraska Community Foundation. "The future of our hometowns depends on young Nebraskans returning to or remaining in our communities. Youth surveys are just one of the tools in our people attraction toolbox. It is imperative that we listen to what they have to say."

## How It Works:

### County Officials Discuss Budget Process

Cheyenne County elected officials recently explained the budget process for the county.

The discussion included County Clerk Beth Fiegenschuh, County Treasurer Shelley Bowlin and Commissioner Randy Miller.

Fiegenschuh compared the budget to a personal checkbook. She said each department has a balance. If there isn't an income, there can't be expenditures. All budgets work the same. The only difference, she said, is the avenues of receipts.

In a budget, the net fund balance carries over to the next fiscal year if it is not spent. Each budget in the county, and the county budget overall, has to balance, they said.

Fiegenschuh said in department budgets, the net fund balance carries over to the next fiscal year. If a department has \$80,000, for example, and only spends, \$75,000, \$5,000 will be carried to the next budget. She stressed that the budget has to balance. If there is a record of deposits in Column A, there must show a record of expenditures equaling that amount in Column B.

"If you don't have it in the budget, you can't spend it," Commissioner Randy Miller said.

Each column has to match in value, according to the three.

The county operates on a fiscal year, starting July 1 and ending June 31.

Commissioner Miller said that while a department can budget for a specific project, they are not required to carry through with it.

"Just because we budget for it, doesn't mean we spend it," he said.

Fiegenschuh, Bowlin and Miller also talked about the mill levy process. Of the total mill levy assessed on a property in the county, Cheyenne County assessing 16 percent. The remainder is assessed by villages or cities, school districts and other tax districts. Miller said the county has lowered the county's mill levy seven

years in a row. He added this year may be the exception with rising costs.

In the budgeting process, each department presents a proposed budget to the commissioners. The commissioners then decide how much of each budget will be cut or kept.

The county's budget hearing was held Tuesday, Sept. 6. On Sept. 26, a joint meeting of county taxing agencies will be held in accordance with LB644.

LB644 requires any taxing district expecting to increase in value by 2 percent or more to be part of a meeting before taxpayers.

The county budget needs to be submitted to the State auditor by September 30, Fiegenschuh said.



## Straight Talk From Steve

### The Bivalent Booster

Two weeks ago, I addressed the reset at the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) due to their failure to adequately guide the American public through the COVID-19 outbreak, and last week I addressed how the military has failed to adjust their policies to the facts about the COVID-19 vaccinations and natural immunity.

So, today I would like to focus my attention on the Federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA), which approved a new booster shot last week. Because of this latest development, I believe it is time to inform the public about the latest science regarding that booster shot as well as other treatments for the coronavirus.

As I said, last week the FDA approved a new booster shot for the new strains of the coronavirus. The new booster is a "bivalent" booster shot meaning that it has been specially formulated to target the original coronavirus as well as the Omicron variant and the latest subvariant of the coronavirus known as BA.5. The booster shots are being manufactured by both Pfizer and Moderna and contain the same problematic mRNA technology used in the original vaccines and boosters that caused 44 percent of pregnant women to lose their babies.

These new bivalent booster shots should be considered experimental. Although Pfizer and Moderna have administered the boosters to some human beings, the FDA is mostly relying upon experimental doses given to mice. When the new boosters were introduced last week Dr. Robert M. Califf, the FDA Commissioner, admitted publicly that regulators do not know when they will see data on how well the new boosters are working. Until we have this data, which could take years, these new bivalent boosters should be considered experimental.

The FDA is chasing its own tail, but you don't have to take this from me. Last week Dr. Gregory Poland of the Mayo Clinic compared the FDA's booster shot strategy to a dog chasing its own tail because the virus tends to mutate faster than the pharmaceutical companies can keep up with new boosters. Because of the virus's tendency to rapidly mutate, Dr. Poland

told the New York Times that, besides the elderly and those with immune deficiencies, the new bivalent booster shots likely won't make a substantial impact with the rest of the population.

So, while the FDA continues to chase its own tail by creating more and more boosters, which only last for a season, other countries around the world are discovering the benefits of using therapeutic drugs to treat the symptoms of the disease. For example, the latest study on the use of ivermectin to treat the symptoms of the coronavirus was published on August 31 by a team of scientists in Brazil. That study can be found online at [www.cureus.com](http://www.cureus.com).

What the Brazilian study found was absolutely amazing! The study focused on 223,128 subjects from the City of Itajai. 159,560 adults were not infected by the coronavirus until July 7, 2020, and among them 28.7 percent never used ivermectin, while the other 71.3 percent did. The study found that among the regular users of ivermectin, there was a 100 percent reduction in the hospitalization rate! Moreover, the study also found that the mortality rate was 92 percent lower among regular users of ivermectin than among non-users of the drug!

So, there you have it. The FDA continues to discourage the use of ivermectin to treat COVID-19 on its website. Meanwhile, there are about 40,000 people hospitalized in the United States for the coronavirus, and we continue to lose about 500 Americans per day to the disease. Common sense would dictate that the FDA reconsider its strategy and take a hard look at therapeutic drugs, such as ivermectin, hydroxychloroquine, and budesonide inhalers.

We now have an abundance of sound scientific evidence that these therapeutic drugs keep large percentages of infected people out of the hospital and prevent them from dying from the disease. For the FDA to continue to deny the American people access to these therapeutic drugs is criminal, and they should be held accountable for every death that occurs without access to these drugs. Whether or not to administer these therapeutic drugs is a decision which should be made between a patient and his or her physician without any more interference from the FDA.







## Raiders Stuff Longhorns, 33-14

### Defensive Gem Gets Sidney The Win

Sidney's Red Raider Football team got on the winning side of the ledger Friday night with a decisive 33-to-14 victory over the visiting Chase County Longhorns at Weymouth Field. It was Senior night, and the big crowd not only got to honor the senior members of the sports and activities teams, but also got to celebrate a big win for the Red Raiders.

Although the Red Raiders were able to move the ball and score last week against Holdrege, the Sidney defense was unable to stop the Longhorns when it mattered. What a difference a week makes. According to Head Coach Ryan Smith, the Red Raiders had a great week of practice, especially on defense, but the question remained whether or not those good practices would translate into improved game-time performances. The verdict is in, and it did.

The Longhorns rely on their running game, led by 5'9" 200lb running back Dawson Mollendor. Mollendor is a big and fast back, with a punishing running style that wears down opposing defenses. But the Red Raiders shut him down early, with their smaller players getting low and delivering punishing hits and gang-tackling which kept the Longhorns from converting first downs and driving the ball. The Red Raiders kept Mollendor under 100 yards for the night, a big accomplishment against the star running back.

Sidney kicked off to start the game, and after Chase County was able to convert one first down, the Red Raider defense rose up and forced a punt. With Sidney starting deep in their own territory, the Longhorns keyed on Sidney running back Luke Holly, with his track-star speed. But the Raiders were able to use misdirection effectively, and junior quarterback Isak Doty broke a big 60 yard run for a touchdown, and after missing the extra point, were up 6-to-0.

Chase County fumbled the ensuing kick off, but recovered and were forced to start their drive deep in their own territory. The Sidney defense again stuffed the Longhorn attack, forcing a punt that gave Sidney good field position. A few plays later, Doty found Alec Doty in the end zone and completed the pass for a touchdown, and after converting the extra point, the Red Raiders were up 13-to-0.

Sidney again shut down the Longhorn offense, with junior Cole Hanley breaking through the line and disrupting the Chase County offense, something he did with regularity for the entire game. After a turnover on downs, Doty again broke a big run into Chase County territory. After a few runs by Luke Holly to bring the Raiders close to the end zone, Sidney fumbled and gave the ball back to Chase County. Longhorn senior quarterback Carter Liebbrandt found sophomore Luis Co for a long completion to mid-field, but on the next play Isak Doty intercepted a Liebbrandt pass to stop the drive. Sidney went into the halftime break up 20-to-0.

Sidney received the ball to start the second half, and after Luke Holly returned the ball to the Sidney to the 32, Isak Doty again broke out a big run down the sideline, going 68 yards for a touchdown. Doty dodged Longhorns and stiff-armed tackling attempts the whole way down, and after the converted extra point, Sidney had a dominating 27-to-0 lead. Sidney scored again on a short pass to Kole Kaiser, who caught the ball and headed for the end zone. At the five yard line Chase County senior Kade Anderson tried to tackle Kaiser, but Kaiser jukeed Anderson badly, and escaped the tackle attempt to score a touchdown. At 33-to-0, the game was effectively over.

Chase County was able to score a touchdown late in the third quarter on a 9 yard touchdown reception by Anderson, and in the fourth quarter on another reception by Anderson for 10 yards and a touchdown, but they were too far behind and the Sidney defense too stout for a comeback. The game ended in a 33-to-14 victory for Sidney.

The Sidney defense was aggressive and relentless, with Cole Hanley in the face of quarterback Liebbrandt all night, and big hits delivered by Reid Fiscus and Conner Hurt. The defense was disciplined and stayed in their lanes, preventing big gains by the Longhorns most of the night. The offense executed well, with Isak Doty gaining over 200 yards on the ground and Luke Holly tallying over one hundred yards. The Raiders had some trouble with penalties and some turnovers, but if Head Coach Ryan Smith works on those aspects during this week's practices like he did on defense last week, look for Sidney to correct those mistakes in short order.

Isak Doty went 6-for-11 in the air for 70 yards and 3 touchdowns and rushed 9 times for 237 yards and 3 touchdowns. Luke Holly carried 18 times for 112 yards in the victory. Kole Kaiser caught 4 passes for 61 yards and 2 touchdowns. Sidney next travels to Gordon to take on the Gordon-Rushville Mustangs on Friday, September 9.

## Bulldogs Fall To Mustangs, 66-20

### 145 YEARS AGO

-There was very little buckwheat sown in Cheyenne County this season, and the late frost has in many localities almost utterly ruined what little there was put into the ground.

-The Maine bean baking establishment on Vine Street is doing an excellent business. It is conducted on the Boston plan, and the rush on Sunday mornings almost equals that at the post office. We wish the management success equal to the juiciness of the beans they are serving up.

-The tramp question is becoming of serious importance. The country is literally overrun with idle men—some of whom would probably work and earn an honest living had they the opportunity of doing so but most of them doubtless prefer an idle life to one of frugality and industry.

-Young men don't try to live without work. You will be sure to fail and the effort will bring you shame and disgrace. There are several young men in this city who can well heed this suggestion. It is a rare occasion on which willing hands cannot find employment, if it is not everlasting, high toned. You can make it high toned if you have drive, patience and honesty in your skins.

There is but one man in Sidney weighing over 300 pound, but as for 250 pounders, we have eleven, fifteen who tip the beam over 200, and the town is flooded with 175 and 190 pound light weights.

We learn from the "Decatur Vindicator", that the Winnebago Indians have petitioned the government for the rights of citizenship. The leading chiefs of the Omahas, contemplate taking the same step. Should their petitions be granted, their lands will be converted into fee simples, and each family will have its individual allotment of land. They thus abandon their tribal relations, and became, to all intents and purposes, citizens of the State.

Mrs. Holden has sold her Sidney property to Mrs. Daniel Barriclow and will in a short time return to the Fatherland which she has not seen since she was a little girl. We predict she will return and spend the rest of her days under the protecting care of Old Glory.

The car in the accident was almost totally demolished.

#### Site Team Concludes Growth Potential Lies To Southeast

#### Company Eyeing Gas Drilling Near Chappell

A Colorado drilling company has shown intense interest in a natural gas field just east of Chappell, according to records from the Nebraska Oil and Gas Commission. Seven notices of intent to drill oil wells have been filed with the commission for the week of Sept. 1.

The company that has filed the intent notices, Rockies Oil & Gas of Johnstown, Colo., plans to drill the wells in the Big Springs Field in Deuel County, with the sections receiving the drilling located in Township 13 North, Range 42 west and Township 13 north, Range 43 west.

According to Dean Rogers of Rockies Oil & Gas, the company plans to have its first drilling unit in position to begin Friday. The wells are in the Niobrara formation, 2,700 feet below the surface. They are in the D sands.

Rogers said the company isn't new to the Panhandle oil fields. While much of its work has been in the Denver basin, which includes northern Colorado, the firm has also been part of six wells in the past year in the Panhandle. Recent projects include wells in the Oshkosh region.

The quick action on the field is to occur because of plans made by Kansas-Nebraska Energy. The field has been a storage unit for KN Energy, but the company has taken the field off its long-term storage roster.

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



#### POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS

If you're a senior citizen, make vigilance your priority! In order to prevent financial exploitation, you must tread lightly whenever faced with an unusual situation. For example, if a vendor seems too insistent and asks for personal information, don't hesitate to say that you're not interested in what they have to offer. Most importantly, never make spur-of-the-moment decisions, and always ask a third party for their opinion when in doubt.

Finally, if you or someone you know believes to be the victim of fraud or any other form of financial abuse, communicate with the authorities right away! Be prudent with passwords. Changing them on a regular basis is a simple and efficient way to protect yourself against fraud.



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**Programmatic Agreement and Historic Preservation for the Sentinel (GBSD) Deployment and Minuteman III Decommissioning and Disposal Project**

In accordance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (54 U.S.C. § 300101 *et seq.*) and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation implementing regulations (36 CFR Part 800), the U.S. Air Force (Air Force) will prepare a Programmatic Agreement for deploying the Sentinel, formerly the Ground Based Strategic Deterrent (GBSD), intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) system, and decommissioning and disposing of the Minuteman III ICBM system. Deployment-related actions would occur both on-base and in the missile fields at Francis E. Warren Air Force Base (AFB), WY; Malmstrom AFB, MT; and Minot AFB, ND. Additional maintenance, training, storage, testing, support, decommissioning, and disposal actions would occur at Hill AFB, UT; the Utah Test and Training Range, UT; Camp Guernsey, WY; and Camp Navajo, AZ. The Programmatic Agreement is being prepared to resolve potential adverse effects from the proposed undertaking on significant historic properties and describe measures that would be conducted to avoid, minimize, or mitigate those adverse effects.

# SUICIDE PREVENTION

*Working Together To Prevent Suicide*



## Is someone you care about suicidal?

World Suicide Prevention Day is an annual campaign that takes place globally on September 10. The aim of the event is to raise awareness about suicide with a focus on increasing public understanding of symptoms and methods of prevention.

Every 40 seconds, a person dies by suicide, and 20 times as many make an attempt. Suicide is caused by an assortment of social, psychological, cultural and genetic factors. It's a leading cause of death among people aged 15 to 24 in North America and in many European countries.

### SIGNS OF SUICIDAL IDEATION

It can be difficult to gauge whether or not



someone is suicidal. Nevertheless, here are some signs to watch out for:

- Excessive sadness, anger, anxiety or moodiness
- Changes in personality
- Changes in appearance
- Withdrawal from friends and family members
- Withdrawal from activities once enjoyed
- Substance abuse
- Reckless/dangerous behaviours
- Threatening suicide (every threat should be taken seriously)

In addition, a sudden calmness after a period of distress or turmoil can sometimes indicate the person has decided to end their own life. In such cases, the individual may make preparations by giving away possessions, visiting loved ones and cleaning their home.

### HOW TO HELP SOMEONE WHO'S SUICIDAL

If you suspect that a friend or loved one is suicidal, talk to them to assess what their intentions are. Research shows that talking about suicide doesn't increase

the likelihood that someone will take their own life. In fact, connecting with someone that cares can make all the difference.

**If the person you're concerned about threatens to kill him or herself, take it seriously. Don't leave the individual alone and ensure they get the support they need. If the risk is immediate, call 911.**

**People who are suicidal and those that care about them can get support 24/7 via the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline by calling 1-800-273-TALK (8255).**

### THE LIFELINE AND 988

988 has been designated as the new three-digit dialing code that will route callers to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (now known as the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline), and is active across the United States.


When people call, text, or chat 988, they will be connected to trained counselors that are part of the existing Lifeline network. These trained counselors will listen, understand how their problems are affecting them, provide support, and connect them to resources if necessary.

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
