## Veteran's Service Committee Additions, Early Jump on Fair Business at Commissioner's Meeting

The December 5 meeting of the County Commissioners started with the approval of a change to conditional use permits for materials such as asphalt and concrete and other minerals. Resolution 22-27 amends Code 5.02 to include commission approval on permits. The vote was unanimous among the commissioners, and will speed the approval process for county road maintenance and repairs.

Next, Veteran Service's Director Fred Wiedeberg informed the commissioners of vacancies in the Veterans Service Committee. With Larry Nelson and John Sanna resigning for personal reasons, James Haddix and Ken Childers, both Navy veterans, were appointed. Since Larry Nelson was the Chairman, Stephanie Disney was appointed Chairperson of the Board. The commissioners approved each nominee and elevation of Disney to Chairperson via separate motion.

County Attorney Paul Schaub then brought up approval of a Memo of Understanding between juvenile services coordinators for Cheyenne, Kimball and Deuel counties to coordinate welfare needs. The expense of these services are provided by state grant, and it will be advantageous for the counties to apply together as a group. The Memo will create an understanding between the counties to share juvenile services together for a more cost effective and comprehensive service. The details of the grant will be discussed further in the next commissioner's meeting.

Next up was a discussion with Kip Miller, Treasurer of the County Fair board. There was about a 30 minute break before Miller arrived. He discussed the progress of the Fair Board in setting up and contracting with the services necessary for next summer's County Fair. Miller detailed that he has received a bid from Cervi Rodeo out of Sterling, Colo., for rodeo services. According to Miller, this company has extensive contacts in the industry and will be able to provide more events and bring more people to the Fair.

The initial plan is to have the PCRA Rodeo, not just rough stock but a full rodeo, on Wednesday, a Tractor Pull on Thursday, Friday's event is still to be decided

but most likely it will be a concert, and on Saturday a Demolition Derby. The Fair Board is working with the Romeo Talent Agency to secure an act that fits what type of music fairgoers prefer and is within budget.

Miller also explained the Demolition Derby purse will be determined by number of entrants, not a flat sum.

The Fair Board is still working on whether or not to have a carnival, and still has a number of factors to determine before they move forward with a contractor. Miller expressed the importance of setting the dates as early as possible, as it make it easier to secure certain

vendors and contractors, and also gives people the ability to plan their vacations and events around the Fair. The commissioners agreed that one of the problems with last year's Fair was the late setting of dates and relatively late start to marketing. Miller was very focused on the importance of setting the dates early and marketing the Fair as quickly as possible. Miller and the commissioner's both stressed the importance of the community getting behind and supporting the fair. The commissioners then adjourned for executive session.

The annual 4-H Achievement Celebration was held Saturday night at the Cheyenne County Fairgrounds with just over 50 people in attendance for the potluck dinner and award ceremony, hosted by Laura Narjes, Cheyenne County Extension Educator, and Chel McMillen, President of the 4-H Council. Recognizing the hard work and dedication of both the kids and leaders involved, this yearly tradition is an important and eagerly awaited event.

The recipient of this years award for **4-H CHARTER CLUB OF EXCELLENCE** went to Dryland Toughies 4-H Club.

To receive the designation as a Nebraska 4-H Club of Excellence, clubs must meet a certain set of criteria and document how this criteria was met. Dryland Toughies met the following requirements: has at least five members, from at least three different families; recites the 4-H Pledge at meetings; meets at least six times per year; chooses/elects youth officers; has youth serve in leadership roles; has one club project, related to curriculum, which they do together; has an adult role model involvement; is facilitated by organizational and project leaders who have successfully completed the volunteer screening; has members who perform a presentation or public speaking at the club level or above; completed one community service project; has members who participate in county, district or state events, and they must celebrate member and club achievements.

### OUTSTANDING 4-H MEMBER

This year they had a 4-H member

that has participated in the fair pop sales and cleanup, the 4-H Spring Carnival, and has done community service including helping with the Angel of Hope, to working with residents in the nursing home. This recipient has been very active in 4-H and is always willing to help wherever needed. **Emily Miller** was awarded the 2022 Outstanding 4-H Member for Cheyenne County. Emily has been a member of the Dryland Toughies and the Sidney Wrangler 4-H Clubs. ## Remembrance of Cheyenne County's First WWII Casualty

I received a phone call on Monday from Jacquin Coxon, a former Sidney resident with a very deep connection to the community. The 93 year-old Ms. Coxon was calling from a senior residence in Loveland, Colo., to talk about her step-brother Myron Eugene Goodwin. Goodwin was the first Cheyenne County casualty of World War II. He was killed in action on December 7, 1941 aboard the U.S.S. West Virginia when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor.

She told me how Myron would have been 102 years old now if he had lived, and how he ended up joining the Navy prior to the start of World War II. After graduating high school, Goodwin joined the Navy, for a number of specific reasons. First, he had been in a roller skating accident and knocked out his front teeth, and knew the Navy would fix them. He also was interested in the printing industry, and the Navy could provide training for him that would help him in a career. Lastly, Coxon recounted how his father, "didn't want to be a Pool Bum...hanging around at the Pool Hall doing nothing all day" and he'd be better off joining the Navy. Myron's father's worked as a printer for the Sidney Telegraph, and since Myron was looking to follow in his father's footsteps, he took the advice and joined the Navy.

Ms. Coxon recalled how former long time editor and publisher of the Sidney Telegraph, Jack Rowe, received the telegram at the Telegraph's office that Myron was listed as missing in action after the attack on Pearl Harbor. About a month later, Goodwin's body was able to be identified, ironically through the dental work the Navy had provided. The family had moved to Gering, with too many sad memories of Myron in Sidney to deal with, it was best to move on by moving away. Myron's remains were then interred in Gering.

Jacquin recalled that for the 50th Anniversary of Pearl Harbor, a plaque in Myron's honor was added in Legion Park, and how she came back to Sidney for the ceremony to honor Myron. "Myron was the sweetest person and a good man. There were so many classmates of Myron's from the Class of 1939 at the ceremony, and we talked and reminisced about Myron and the times we had, it was wonderful. It was a great honor and it meant the world to me to see Myron remembered and honored like that," she said.

As we lose the last of the World War II generation to old age, it is important to remember the heart-breaking sacrifices and hardships our ancestors faced, and how they retained their stoicism and dignity in the face of these challenges. For all of our modern problems, sometimes we can look to our ancestors and learn from the hard lessons they had to endure before we create our own tragedies in the future.

## One dead following single-vehicle semi-truck accident; Multiple agencies respond to tractor-trailer accident which blocked westbound interstate traffic on December 3

A 42-year-old Illinois resident is dead following a single-vehicle accident involving a tractor trailer on Interstate 80.

According to a press release from the Cheyenne County Attorney, multiple agencies—including the Nebraska State Patrol Hazardous Materials Team—were dispatched to the scene of the crash on the evening of December 3. The tractor and trailer were blocking both sides of westbound Interstate 80 traffic with the driver presumed deceased. This was later confirmed by Cheyenne County Deputy Josh Deines.

While investigating the accident, witnesses who had been following the semi-truck before the accident told the Cheyenne County Sheriff's Office it had drifted from the interstate onto the concrete shoulder and then grass shoulder. At one point, according to the witnesses, both the tractor and trailer were on the grass shoulder.

The semi-truck then turned back onto Interstate 80, causing the tractor and trailer to turn onto its passenger side. Witnesses told the Cheyenne County Sheriff's Office the truck

had been traveling about 70 miles per hour and they had not seen any brake lights.

Another witness, the driver of another semi-truck, said he approached the windshield of the truck and saw the driver on the passenger door. He and another person were able to break the windshield, at which time it appeared the driver had died.

The driver has been identified as Mohammad Pirzad of Buffalo Grove, Illinois. The cause of death has been ruled as massive blunt force trauma due to a motor vehicle accident. The truck contained a variety of chemicals including acetone, acetonitrile, isopropanol, ethanol and ammonia. The chemicals were contained to the accident site.

Other responding agencies dispatched by the Cheyenne County Emergency Communication Center included the Sidney Volunteer Fire Department, the Potter Volunteer Fire Department, Regional West Medical Center Emergency Medical Services, the Cheyenne County Sheriff's Office, Nebraska State Patrol, Region 21 Emergency Management and the Nebraska Department of Roads.

Additionally, we have generous nonprofits throughout Nebraska aiding our children and families. Adoption Month is also an opportunity to celebrate and honor Nebraska's adoptive families. Recently, I met with several of these families to thank them in person on behalf of all Nebraskans. This included Mark and Megan Grimes of Lincoln. They adopted their niece, five-year-old Naomi, on May 3rd of this year. Due to substance abuse and other issues, Naomi's biological mother was unable to provide a safe home for her daughter. In 2019, Megan and Mark stepped up to foster Naomi. The recent adoption has allowed Naomi to thrive in a safe, stable home, while maintaining an active relationship with her biological mother. "We've enjoyed watching Naomi come into her personality," Megan told me. "She is a determined

playground climber, ruthless card player and collector of all-things-nature. We feel fortunate to have her as a member of our family."

Naomi is one of 354 children previously in the custody of the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services who joined their forever families as their adoptions were finalized in court this year. Several of these families were made official this month during Adoption Month celebrations held at courthouses throughout Nebraska. For example, Rakeesha Barber of Omaha finalized her adoption of three siblings ages ten, eight, and one during Omaha's Adoption Day event on November 19. Newlyweds Nathan and Brandi Arneal also adopted their son that same weekend, after Brandi had fostered him for three years.

In appreciation of adoptive families in Nebraska, and to highlight how adoption can help change a life, I've proclaimed November as Adoption Awareness Month in Nebraska. Though the end of November is fast-approaching, the time is always right to explore how you can help Nebraska's children in need of a family. ## Two Weddings

Twenty-eight-year-old Naomi Biden married twenty-five-year-old Peter Neal on the south lawn, at the White House, on Saturday, November 19, 2022, beginning at 11:00 a.m. Eastern time.

Because there was no tent, and because the temperature was a chilly 39 degrees, some 250 guests received shawls, hand-warmers, and blankets once they arrived. They also checked in their cell phones.

The President and First Lady Jill Biden hosted the ceremony, and the family paid for the wedding.

At a few minutes after 11:00 a.m., the bride's father, Hunter Biden, and her mother, Kathleen Buhle, walked alongside their daughter on a white carpet leading from the White House's south door to a point on the south lawn, where two officiants completed the ceremony a few minutes before noon.

That evening inside the White House, some 325 guests attended a reception that featured desserts and dancing.

The President said, "It has been a joy to watch Naomi grow, discover who she is, and carve out such an incredible life for herself." The next day, Sunday, November 20, Joe Biden turned 80 years old, the first octogenarian to serve as President of the United States.

This was the nineteenth wedding held at the White House, although a first for a granddaughter and a first held on the south lawn.

A wedding that could have been—and perhaps should have been—held at the White House was when Franklin Delano Roosevelt wed his fifth cousin, once removed, Eleanor Roosevelt, niece of the then current President, Theodore Roosevelt. The day was March 17, 1905.

Instead, it was held in New York City, in Mrs. Henry

Parrish's home, Eleanor's aunt.

On December 7, 1892, when Eleanor was eight years old, she lost her mother due to an outbreak of diphtheria. Two years later, when ten, her father Elliot Roosevelt died of a seizure, due to his prolonged alcoholism. Eleanor's maternal grandmother, Mary Livingston Hall, stepped in and raised Eleanor.

Elliot Roosevelt was Theodore's younger brother. Hence, the President was fond of Eleanor, a niece.

The wedding was set for March 17, because the President was scheduled to march in the St. Patrick's Day Parade in New York City that same day. At the wedding, the President walked Eleanor down the aisle, and gave her away. This was news for the city's news reporters.

Theodore though was a master at self-promotion. His daughter Alice Roosevelt Longworth remarked, "My father always wanted to be the corpse at every funeral, the bride at every wedding, and the baby at every christening."

Eleanor and Franklin's marriage held fast, even after she discovered that Franklin was having an affair with her social secretary Lucy Mercer. A historian, Doris Kearns Goodwin, said, "Their union from that point on was more of a political partnership."

Eleanor wrote opinion columns and gave speeches in person and on the radio, and in her media announcements, she championed the rights of women and African-Americans.

On Sunday afternoon, December 7, 1941, the White House received word that at 8:00 a.m., Honolulu time, Japanese air forces had bombed the U.S. naval base at Pearl Harbor, killed hundreds of American sailors and destroyed the Pacific fleet, save for the aircraft carriers, then out at sea.

Because Eleanor was scheduled to give her weekly radio program that same evening, "Over Our Coffee Cups," she decided that she would speak first to the American people

about the Pearl Harbor attack, before her husband, the president, did so. She told the American people,

"I am speaking to you tonight at a very serious moment in our history. The Cabinet is convening, and the leaders in Congress are meeting with the President. The State Department and the Army and Navy officials have been with the President all afternoon.

"In fact, the Japanese ambassador was talking to the president at the very time that Japan's airships were bombing our citizens in Hawaii.

"For months now the knowledge that something of this kind might happen has been hanging over our heads, and yet it seemed impossible to believe. That is over now, and there is no more uncertainty. We know what we have to face, and we know we are ready to face it.

"We must go about our daily business more determined than ever to do ordinary things well."

The next day President Franklin Roosevelt addressed Congress, and asked for a declaration of war. He said, "Yesterday, December 7, 1941, a date which will live in infamy, the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan.

"But always will our whole Nation remember the character of the onslaught against us."

The vote was 82-0 in the Senate, and 388-1 in the House. Jeannette Rankin, a Montana Republican, the first woman elected to Congress, and a pacifist voted against a declaration of war.

FDR and Eleanor faced hard times: a Depression and a war with Japan and Germany. Yet, they had Theodore Roosevelt's presence and blessing at their wedding, and Naomi Biden and Peter Neal had the presence and blessing of the current president at their wedding. We can wish the young couple well.

Saturday night was Paradise. Sunday morning, hell broke loose. "Let us hold fast our confession of hope without wavering, for He Who promised is faithful. We are not those who draw back, but those who believe to salvation." Hebrews 10:23, 39.

The U.S. Pacific Fleet of Navy ships rested, comfortably, at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. War had been declared in Germany for a second time. The young Elizabeth Windsor and her new husband, Philip Mountbatten had come to the States to visit. President Roosevelt took them to see our powerful armada.

The young Prince, having grown up under the Lord of Britain's Admiralty, observed it was not wise to keep so large a fleet in one place. FDR disregarded his wisdom.

We visited this amazing memorial in 2014. Fuel still leaks

from the engines of the Arizona where she lies beneath the surface in Pearl Harbor. 1177 men went down with her. 2335 servicemen and 68 civilians died when Japan's air force struck. Fortunately, all three of the U.S. Fleet's carriers were at sea, but 169 Navy and Army aircraft were destroyed at Pearl. Our son, a Naval Aviator, worked in a building which still has bullet holes from Japan's strafing, December 7, 1941.

At home, on the Continent, food, fuel, clothing and transportation was rationed or severely limited. Car makers began to build tanks, ship builders and airplane manufacturers employed men outside the military and courageous women.

The Women's Airforce Service Pilots (WASP) proved a secret weapon. Of the thousands who signed up, only 1102 made it through training. They had to have a civilian pilot's license and pay their own way through basic training, Dallas, Texas. They trained combat fighters and ferried troops. De-commissioned after the war, they kept rapport within their ranks. Congressional recognition was denied for their heroics until 1977 when President Jimmy Carter granted them military status. Congress awarded 200 ladies, now in their 80s and

90s, a Congressional Gold Medal in 2010. Google Women with Wings 75 years.

During our visit to Pearl Harbor, we toured the museum which tells the story from our standpoint and from the Japanese point of view. Veterans came, each day, to share amazing feats and war stories with interested parties. Also housed there is a submarine and a 'bell' used, successfully, to rescue 8 or 9 men at a time, from a sub carrying over 200, onto rescue ships.

Our son and wife, both U.S. Naval Aviator Commanders Retired, left their marks in the archives of American history. If you're alive and well, thank God! If you're a U.S. citizen, thank a Veteran. If you're reading this in English, thank a teacher.

"Through Him we will do valiantly! Through Your Name we will trample down those who rise up against us." Psalm 44 and 60.

## Monthly 4-H Workshops Are Underway



Now that it's the holiday season, gifts are probably on your mind – and you might intend for some of those gifts to go to charities. Although your intentions are good, you could be shortchanging both your recipients and yourself with your method of giving. But with some guidance, you can make choices that work well for you and those charitable groups you support.

Of course, you could simply give money to these groups. However, by donating other types of assets, can you increase the value of your gift and gain greater tax benefits, too?

It's certainly possible, but your ability to gain any tax advantages depends somewhat on whether or not you can itemize deductions on your tax return. Due to legislation passed a few years ago that significantly increased the standard deduction, many people

may no longer be itemizing. But if you still itemize, you can generally deduct up to 60% of your adjusted gross income for cash donations to IRS-qualified charities.

Another contribution strategy involves donating other assets, such as stocks. You could donate stocks directly to a charitable group, but you might gain more benefits by making an irrevocable contribution to a donor-advised fund (DAF). Again, assuming you can itemize, you can deduct the full fair-market value of the asset, up to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income, and your contributions can be invested in mutual funds or similar vehicles. The contributions have the opportunity for growth, and distributions to the charity are tax-free. You can then decide, on your own timetable, which IRS-qualified charitable groups you would like to receive the money. Furthermore, if you donate stocks that have

risen in value, you won't incur potential capital gains taxes that you would have when you eventually sold the stocks. These taxes can be considerable, especially if you've held the stocks for a long time. (You'll want to consult with your tax advisor on how charitable gifts can affect your taxes, especially if you're thinking of using a donor-advised fund.)

These charitable donation methods are not secrets, and they are available to many people – you don't have to be wealthy to employ them. Yet, here's an interesting statistic:

Those who work with a financial advisor on charitable strategies are more than three

times as likely to donate non-cash assets such as stocks than those who contribute to charities but don't work with an advisor, according to an August 2022 survey from financial services firm Edward Jones

and Morning Consult, a global data intelligence company. These findings suggest that many more people could be taking advantage of tax-smart charitable giving moves – if only they had some help or guidance.

Also, by getting some professional financial assistance, you may find it easier to implement your charitable giving decisions within your overall financial strategy, which is designed to help you meet all your important long-term goals, such as achieving a comfortable retirement.

Your instinct to help support charitable groups is a worthy one – and by getting some help, you can turn this impulse into actions that may work to everyone's benefit.

## Bird flu prompts slaughter of 1.8M chickens in NE

OMAHA, Neb. — Nebraska agriculture officials say another 1.8 million chickens must be killed after bird flu was found on a farm in the latest sign that the outbreak that has already prompted the slaughter of more than 50 million birds nationwide continues to spread.

The Nebraska Department of Agriculture said Saturday that the state's 13th case of bird flu was found on an egg-laying farm in northeast Nebraska's Dixon County, about 120 miles (193 kilometers) north of Omaha, Nebraska.

Just like on other farms where bird flu has been found this year, all the chickens on the Nebraska farm will be killed to limit the spread of the disease. The U.S. Department of Agriculture says more than 52.3 million birds in 46 states — mostly chickens and turkeys on commercial farms — have been slaughtered as part of this year's outbreak.

Nebraska is second only to Iowa's 15.5 million birds killed with 6.8 million birds now affected at 13 farms.

In most past bird flu outbreaks the virus largely died off during the summer, but this year's version found a way to linger and started to make a resurgence this fall with more than 6 mil-

lion birds killed in September.

The virus is primarily spread by wild birds as they migrate across the country. Wild birds can often carry the disease without showing symptoms. The virus spreads through droppings or the nasal discharge of an infected bird, which can contaminate dust and soil.

Commercial farms have taken a number of steps to prevent the virus from infecting their flocks, including requiring workers to change clothes before entering barns and sanitizing trucks as they enter the farm, but the disease can be difficult to control. Zoos have also taken precautions and closed some exhibits to protect their birds.

Officials say there is little risk to human health from the virus because human cases are extremely rare and the infected birds aren't allowed to enter the nation's food supply. Plus, any viruses will be killed by properly cooking poultry to 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

But the bird flu outbreak has contributed to the rising prices of chicken and turkey along with the soaring cost of feed and fuel.

## Raiders Runner-Up At Western Conference Tournament

Sidney's Red Raider Boys Basketball team was unable to break through against the Scottsbluff Bearcats' defense in the fourth quarter on Saturday, and had to settle for runner-up honors as they fell to Scottsbluff 65-to-59 in the championship game of the Western Conference Tournament at WNCC-Scottsbluff Saturday afternoon.

Sidney made it to the championship game by way of a big win against Mitchell in the first round of the tournament, in a game played at Gering High School. The Red Raiders jumped out to a big early lead on a hot start by senior Micah Schneider's 15 points in the first quarter, giving Sidney a 22-to-12 first quarter lead. Sidney's offense stayed hot and their defense did a great job shutting down the Tigers' offense and led 40-to-18 at the half. Sidney cruised through the second half for a 72-to-40 win, led by Schneider's 23 points followed by senior Jaeden Dillehay's 14 points.

Sidney next matched up against Gering, and the Bulldogs jumped out early to a 16-to-6 lead before the Red Raiders went on a big 28-to-8 run to build a 34-to-24 halftime lead. Sidney continued their strong offensive showing and put up 21 points in the third quarter to give the Raiders a 55-to-34 lead going into the final period. Sidney then held off the Bulldogs and cruised to a 67-to-52 win. Seniors Isak Doty and Jaeden Dillehay each had 16 points for the Red Raiders in the win.

Saturday late afternoon had the Red Raiders match up with Scottsbluff,

who had defeated Arvada 81-to-24 on Thursday and Sterling 65-to-37 on Friday to advance to the championship game. Again, Sidney jumped out to a quick start with Schneider again draining three three point shots in the first period to give Sidney an early 18-to-10 lead. But the Bearcats went on a run starting late in the first period, and gained momentum until they tied Sidney at 20-to-20 about halfway through the second period and continued to score. Sidney battled back from six points down in the final seconds to cut the Bearcats' lead to three at 30-to-27 at the half.

But Sidney just could not get their offense back into a rhythm in the third quarter, and had some costly turnovers converted for easy points that let the Bearcats build a 49-to-40 lead going into the fourth quarter. Scottsbluff put senior Tate Talkington on Micah Schneider, and he guarded Schneider so well he scored no points in the second half until the very end of the fourth quarter. Sidney battled back and patiently closed the gap to 50-to-49, but a few key missed shots and a few critical turnovers down the stretch gave the Bearcats the ability to pull out the six point 65-to-59 win. Doty led the offense for Sidney with 16 points while Scheider finished with 15 points for the game. Sidney next travels to Imperial on Friday to match up with the 1-and-1 Chase County Longhorns. Chase County opened the season with a 59-to-49 win over Cozad at home, then lost at McCook 67-to-41.

## Lady Raiders Best At Western Conference Tournament

Sidney's Lady Raider Girls Basketball team defeated Scottsbluff Saturday to win the Western Conference Tournament and jump out to their first 3-and-0 start since 2008. Sidney's sharp shooting and tough defense took them to the championship round, first with a blowout defeat of Arvada on Thursday then by outlasting Chadron Friday night to set up the showdown with Scottsbluff Saturday afternoon for the championship.

Thursday's contest was similar to last year's game against Arvada to start the tournament, and ended in an expected big win for the Sidney girls. The Lady Raiders' smothering defense kept the Arvada squad off the board for the entire second half and only allowed four points total in the 88-to-4 win for Sidney. Senior Reese Riddle led the scoring for Sidney with 25 points, followed by junior Karsyn Leeling with 12 points and sophomore Carli Black with 10 points in the victory.

On Friday it was a different story as Sidney and Chadron played a close game, with the teams battling throughout the contest. Sidney's defense was able to hold back Chadron in the fourth quarter to give the Lady Raiders a five-point win, 49-to-44. Riddle agains led the scoring with 14 points, followed by junior Chloe Ahrens with nine points in the win.

Saturday afternoon's showdown with the Scottsbluff Lady Bearcats was held on the big court at WNCC-Scottsbluff, with a big crowd present for the matchup. Sidney would need to hold down Scottsbluff's sharpshooting senior Payton Burda, who hit a school-record 10 three point shots in the previous day's win over Gering.

Sidney was ready for the challenge, with senior Rheagan Stanley mirroring Burda's every move, disrupting her rhythm and preventing her from connecting on any three point shots. Stanley

and the Sidney defense kept Burda scoreless until the fourth quarter, and held her to just one field goal for two points in the entire contest. After trailing in the first half, Sidney came back and pulled away from the Lady Bearcats. The Sidney defense was able to shut down the Lady Bearcats' offense in the second half, forcing turnovers and bad shots while clogging up the inside and grabbing rebounds. The Lady Raiders did a great job a taking away the Scottsbluff passing lanes and let their patient offense pad the big lead by moving the ball around and running down the clock. Reese Riddle again led the offense, driving inside and tallying 21 points to lead all scorers followed by junior Payton Schrotberger with 9 points in the win.

The Lady Raiders next go on the road Friday and match up against Chase County, who have opened their season 2-and-0 with big wins over Cozad and McCook.



Underpass Study May Be Ordered  
State Offers Engineering Assistance On Project

Sidney's hopes for an overpass or underpass across the Union Pacific tracks—one of the community's prime needs for more than thirty years—took an upturn Friday when Councilman H. E. Pierson was advised by the state highway department that an agreement between the city and state is now available, leading up to an engineering study of the project.

Cost to the city for the survey would be "considerably less than one thousand dollars" for a preliminary job, Mr. Pierson was informed, but probably would run up to \$8,000 if a complete engineering recommendation is made.

An underpass is favored by the state and federal officials, Mr. Pierson was told, and the preliminary estimates of cost are in the neighborhood of four hundred thousand dollars. Of this amount, state and federal funds, would cover 45 percent, the Union Pacific would contribute 10 percent and the city would be required to finance the other 45 percent. Thus, Sidney could expect to shoulder at least \$180 thousand dollars of the cost.

Right of way and property damage costs would be shared equally by the city and the state-federal agencies. Mr. Pierson did not know if these costs were figured into the \$400 thousand dollars.

The underpass would be built on 13th Avenue, which has been recognized by the federal highway department as an essential farm-to-market connecting link. The underpass must be part of a farm-to-market road in order to qualify for state-federal fund assistance.

## Citizens Will Organize Swimming Pool Effort

About 30 Sidney citizens interested in securing a new swimming facility for the community attended a two-hour briefing and discussion Monday night with the City Council.

A report on the existing pool in Legion Park, now 31 years old, prepared by John E. Olsson & Associates, was reviewed and distributed to those attending by Mayor John Gottschalk.

The Olsson report noted several signs of deterioration at the current pool, including not enough deck area, poor bathhouse security and deterioration, breakage of concrete gutters, cracked pool floor, inadequate diving area and water too deep for small children in the shallow end of the pool.

However, the Lincoln-based consulting engineer concluded that the pool is still has a few years use left. The report stated, "considering the age and condition of the pool, we cannot recommend spending any large sum remodeling, enlarging or enclosing it. Funds should be budgeted to maintain it in a safe and sanitary condition while steps are taken to build a new pool in the near future".

The purpose of the meeting as set out by the Mayor Monday, was to provide maximum factual material, upon which a local citizens group could organize and begin building community support for a new facility. He cautioned those present that they should seek to arrive at design and location compromises suitable to most people before taking the issue to a bond vote.

New Recycling Balers Put Into Operation This Week

Three new balers for recycled waste materials were put into operation by Sidney Landfill personnel this week.

The balers, paid for by a state grant administered by the Nebraska Dept. of Environmental Quality, will make the storage and shipping of recycled newspapers, aluminum, plastic jugs and glass much easier and more economical, said Roger Holsinger, manager of the city's recycling operation.

The city collects about 11 cubic yards of paper each week, Holsinger said, and one of the new balers is used to compress the paper into bales weighing about 1,000 pounds. Each bale contains about three cubic feet of paper, he said.

When enough bales are on hand, they are transported by a special trailer to a buyer in Denver, Colo.

Only one of the trailers is used for paper, explained Larry Heinrich, public services coordinator for the city. The other two are used for aluminum cans and plastic milk jugs. These wastes are compressed when collected each week, and the baler acts as a storage unit until it is filled.

Brown and clear glass is not compressed, but sold in bulk to the Coors Co. in Golden, Colo.

"These balers really make our recycling program work," said Heinrich. "The city couldn't have afforded them without the grant."

## Dead End For Deadwood Trail?

The future of the \$633,500 Sidney-Deadwood Trail Project is in jeopardy, and the city council was informed at its regular Tuesday meeting that the deadline for turning in plans to the state is up in three weeks.

"It seems we're stuck between a rock and a hard place," said Councilman Dalan Hiatt.

The rock would be the deadline to turn in plans to the state so the city could receive \$500,000 in the form of a Nebraska Department of Roads transportation enhancement grant. The hard place is Orville Filsinger's refusal to sign an easement agreement allowing the trail to be built on property he wants to sell.

City Manager Gary Person told the council it has two choices since the project deadlines are looming. Option 1 is to turn down the grant money, which would make it more difficult in the future for the city to receive money for transportation enhancement, and Option 2 is to ask the state for a third six-month extension.

John Hehnke, public service director for Sidney, told the council he is 90 percent certain the state will refuse the request for an extension unless there is evidence of a pending sale of property and the proposed purchaser was willing to sign an agreement.

"It'd be a great project and I'd hate to see us turn back half a million dollars," Hiatt said.

But unless a purchaser is found for the property, the city has no choice but to tell the state it can't accept the money.

Mayor Wendall Gaston said the council is putting out a plea to the public for anyone who would want the land and doesn't mind the trail going through it to purchase it.




